Course Description

This course is a broad introduction to literary genres, elements and techniques in cultural/historical context. Literary works will be chosen from all three genres and various historical periods. The readings will illustrate various genres, historical contexts and cultural contexts, as well as the relationships between them. PREREQUISITE: ENGL C1000 or ENGL C1000E. Transfer Credit: CSU: UC. Lecture Content

Genres Fiction, such as novel, novella, and short story. Poetry Drama Literary elements: plot, theme, character, setting, style, tone, figurative language. Literary techniques Appropriate to the Major Genres Elements of Fiction Elements of Poetry Elements of Drama Literature in Historical Context Literary historical periods such as Biblical, Classical, Medieval, Renaissance, Reformation, Romantic, Modern, Postmodern. Literary forms typical of the various historical periods Literature in Cultural Context General cultural categories such as East/West, Old World/New World, as well as specific cultural or ethnic categories. Literary forms popular within or utilized by various cultures, such as magical realist novel/Latin America.
