Course Description

This course offers an in-depth exploration of film history, criticism, and aesthetics through the director's perspective, tracing the evolution of directing from the silent era to contemporary cinema. Students will analyze diverse directorial styles across various genres and historical periods, critically assess films through theoretical frameworks, and investigate aesthetic elements such as mise-en-scene, cinematography, and editing. The course also examines directors' contributions from different cultural and historical contexts, highlighting their influence on global cinematic trends and cultural narratives. Designed for Film & Television majors and students with a strong interest in film, the course includes lectures, readings, film viewings, discussions, and a range of assignments and projects. Course Level Student Learning Outcome(s)

- Explore how key historical facts, technological advancements, and trends in film history have influenced directorial choices and shaped the evolution of cinematic storytelling. Analyze this exploration into meaningful observations throughout the class.
- Examine the contributions of key directors and their representative styles throughout film history. Class discussions and assignments highlight how these approaches have impacted cinematic techniques, storytelling, and the evolution of film as an art form.
- Investigate the differences among various film genres from a director's perspective. Demonstrate how directors adapt their techniques and stylistic choices to convey each genre's unique characteristics and themes effectively.

Course Objectives

- 7. Identify the origins and historical progression of the "Documentary" Genre. Learn and identify the various pioneers of the early Documentary movement.
- 8. Discuss and identify the filmic style and biographical history of Sir David Lean. Understand and discuss the development and milestones of the "Epic" film.
- 9. Identify and discuss the visual and story trademarks a Stanley Kubrick Film. Have knowledge of the biographical history of Stanley Kubrick.
- 10. Identify and discuss the visual and story trademarks of the "Film Noir" Genre Discuss and identify the biographical history and filmic style of John Huston.
- 11. Discuss and identify the biographical history and filmic style of Clint Eastwood.
- 12. Discuss and identify the biographical history and filmic style of Frank Capra. Have knowledge of the development and milestones of the "WWII Propaganda" film.
- 13. Identify the trademarks of a Howard Hawks Film. Understand, identify and discuss the defining elements of the "Screwball Comedy" Genre.
- 14. Identify the trademarks of the "Samurai" and Akira Kurosawa Film Identify and discuss the pivotal European Directors of the 50s and 60s
