#### **Course Description**

- · 9. Tell a story through photos, without an accompanying article.
- · 10. Edit and crop pictures.
- 11. Analyze ethics and laws as they pertain to photojournalism.
- 12. Demonstrate an understanding of the history of photojournalism and the use of photography in various publications.
