

# CRIMINAL JUSTICE (CJ)

## CJ G046 4.5 Units (80 lecture hours)

### Civilian Supervisory, Law Enforcement

**Grading Mode:** Pass/No Pass

Not Transferable.

This course is a California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (P.O.S.T.) certified course which provides newly appointed or experienced civilian supervisors with formal training in the concepts, techniques, and practical application of basic supervisory skills pertaining to police operations.

## CJ G054 3 Units (40 lecture hours; 42 lab hours)

### Peace Officer Preparation

**Grading Mode:** Pass/No Pass

Not Transferable.

Formerly: Police Academy, Regular Basic Course, Orientation. This course provides students with information and preparation for the Regular Basic Course (Police Academy). Students will receive instruction on pre-employment background investigations, interviews and testing process. Activities will include introduction to physical fitness exercises, military drills, and ceremony, which are designed to simulate police academy attendance. Students will also participate in self-assessments consisting of the POST Work Sample Test Battery (WSTB) and POST Entry-Level Law Enforcement Test Battery (PELLETB). Students should consider a medical clearance from their physician of choice prior to participation in the intense physical activity required in this course.

## CJ G061 1 Unit (24 lecture hours)

### Training Manager

**Grading Mode:** Pass/No Pass

Not Transferable.

This course is designed for those California law enforcement agency employees that are being assigned as a training manager responsible for implementation of California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) guidelines. This course will allow the training manager to attain POST compliance regarding legal issues associated with training, determining individual and organizational training needs, and training records management.

## CJ G064 33 Units (399 lecture hours; 610 lab hours)

### Police Academy - Regular Basic Course

**Prerequisite(s):** CJ G054.

**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter

Not Transferable.

This course provides Basic Police Academy training in compliance with the minimum standards established by the California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST). POST certified training includes criminal law, search and seizure, laws of evidence, traffic laws and procedures, investigative techniques, patrol procedures, firearms, vehicle operations, defensive tactics, physical fitness, report writing, and first aid/cardio pulmonary resuscitation. Students must pass a criminal history check pursuant to California Penal Code section 13511.5, and possess a valid driver's license.

## CJ G070 4 Units (80 lecture hours)

### Sergeant Supervisory, Law Enforcement

**Grading Mode:** Pass/No Pass

Not Transferable.

This course provides Basic Police Academy training in compliance with the minimum standards established by the California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST). POST certified training includes criminal law, search and seizure, laws of evidence, traffic laws and procedures, investigative techniques, patrol procedures, firearms, vehicle operations, defensive tactics, physical fitness, report writing, and first aid/cardio pulmonary resuscitation. Students must pass a criminal history check pursuant to California Penal Code section 13511.5, and possess a valid driver's license.

## CJ G078 8.5 Units (160 lecture hours)

### Public Safety Dispatcher Basic

**Grading Mode:** Pass/No Pass

Not Transferable.

This course aims for the student to understand the primary roles, responsibilities, and duties of a public safety dispatcher as required by the California Commission on Peace Officers Standards and Training (POST). Students will be introduced to the standardized dispatcher skills and knowledge necessary to work in a communications center productively and professionally. This 160-hour POST course is offered in an intensive 4-week course or an extended 16-week course.

## CJ G080 2 Units (40 lecture hours)

### Communications Training Officer

**Prerequisite(s):** CJ G078 or CJ G079.

**Advisory:** Recommended for students with a minimum of one year experience as a public safety dispatcher.

**Grading Mode:** Pass/No Pass

Not Transferable.

The course will provide the student with a fundamental understanding of the role and duties of the Communications Training Officer (CTO). The student will apply effective instructional strategies and understand methods for evaluating novice public safety dispatchers. The student will demonstrate coaching and mentoring skills through interactive experiences, such as role-playing, simulations, and written exercises. Concepts to be covered will include instructional techniques, student assessment and evaluation.

## CJ G090 24.5 Units (327.5 lecture hours; 355 lab hours)

### Specialized Investigator's Basic Course (SIBC)

**Prerequisite(s):** Current employment as a Specialized Investigator or Specialized Investigator Trainee in a California law enforcement agency.

**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter

Not Transferable.

This course teaches the basic knowledge, skills and ethical standards to satisfy the minimum required qualifications established by the California Commission of Peace Officers Standards and Training (POST) for employees serving as Specialized Investigators in the State of California. The course includes academic, physical, psychomotor and affective (ethical behavior) student learning objectives. Letter grade does not guarantee receiving a POST certificate. Students must achieve success in all domains established by POST standards to be awarded a POST certificate of completion.

<p><b>CJ G092</b> <b>4 Units (80 lecture hours)</b>  <b>SWAT, Special Weapons And Tactics, Basic</b>  <b>Prerequisite(s):</b> CJ G064.  <b>Grading Mode:</b> Pass/No Pass            Not Transferable.            Concepts, planning, tactical operations, approach/entry/search techniques; use of chemical agents, weapons, rappelling and task-related physical activities. A two-week course.</p>	<p><b>CJ G123</b> <b>3 Units (54 lecture hours)</b>  <b>Juvenile Law</b>  <b>Grading Mode:</b> Standard Letter  <b>Transfer Credit:</b> CSU; UC: Credit Limitation: CJ G123 and CJ G141 combined: maximum credit, 1 course.            This course provides a study of the American juvenile justice system including the roles of the three components of the criminal justice system: law enforcement, courts, and corrections. It examines patterns of criminal delinquent behavior and the historical and modern theories that aim to explain delinquent behavior and strategies to mitigate it. This course also examines dependent children as a result of abuse and neglect. <b>C-ID:</b> AJ 220.</p>
<p><b>CJ G095</b> <b>3 Units (40 lecture hours; 40 lab hours)</b>  <b>Leadership Development Program For Law Enforcement</b>  <b>Prerequisite(s):</b> CJ G064 and CJ G070.  <b>Grading Mode:</b> Pass/No Pass            Not Transferable.            This course is designed to teach the necessary components for examining and learning the essentials of leadership and to recognize and distinguish issues which influence police integrity, public trust, and loyalty. It analyzes the evaluation policy of the law enforcement agency. It appraises the current system, and examines how assertive leadership influences the behavior and performance of subordinates. It also teaches preparation and formulation of employee performance appraisals. It compares and assesses the supervisor's role in the disciplinary process. In addition, it examines connection between leadership and effective communication. The difference between civil and criminal accountability will be explored and debated along with the concept and application of Community Oriented Policing and Problem Solving.</p>	<p><b>CJ G128</b> <b>3 Units (54 lecture hours)</b>  <b>Criminal Procedure and Evidence</b>  <b>Grading Mode:</b> Standard Letter  <b>Transfer Credit:</b> CSU.            This course is a study of procedural criminal and evidentiary law. It provides an examination and analysis of due process in criminal proceedings from pre-arrest through trial and appeal. It also focuses on the categories of evidence and legal rules governing its admission and exclusion in the criminal process. <b>C-ID:</b> AJ 122.</p>
<p><b>CJ G099</b> <b>2 Units (24 lecture hours; 16 lab hours)</b>  <b>P.O.S.T. Instructor Certification</b>  <b>Prerequisite(s):</b> CJ G064.  <b>Grading Mode:</b> Pass/No Pass            Not Transferable.            This course specifically addresses delivery of the POST (California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training) Basic Course curriculum and is designed to expand and enhance the competency and effectiveness of the criminal justice instructor. Course components are structured to deal with the subject matter expertise, various instructional techniques, adult learning concepts, student driven learning and validation exercises.</p>	<p><b>CJ G137</b> <b>3 Units (54 lecture hours)</b>  <b>Community Relations And Special Issues In Criminal Justice</b>  <b>Grading Mode:</b> Standard Letter  <b>Transfer Credit:</b> CSU; UC.            This course addresses multiple social issues challenging law enforcement today. It explores the vital aspects of Community Oriented Policing (COP) and Problem-Solving, Proactive/Reactive Policing (ROP/POP), cultural diversity, prejudice/discrimination/hate/stereo-typing/victim selection/victimization, and other social forces that shape human values and attitudes. The course examines current demographic trends, dynamics, and interactions of California's minority groups and multi-faceted sub-cultures as they relate to the criminal justice system in a free society. <b>C-ID:</b> AJ 160.</p>
<p><b>CJ G110</b> <b>3 Units (54 lecture hours)</b>  <b>Criminal Investigation</b>  <b>Grading Mode:</b> Standard Letter  <b>Transfer Credit:</b> CSU.            This course addresses the fundamentals of criminal investigation including searches, interview and interrogation techniques, crime scene investigation, sources of information, and case preparation and management. <b>C-ID:</b> AJ 140.</p>	<p><b>CJ G140</b> <b>3 Units (54 lecture hours)</b>  <b>Introduction to Criminal Justice</b>  <b>Advisory:</b> ENGL C1000 or ENGL C1000E.  <b>Grading Mode:</b> Standard Letter  <b>Transfer Credit:</b> CSU; UC.            This course analyzes the characteristics of the criminal justice system. The course introduces students to the history of criminal law, the legal process, and theories of punishment. The focus will be on the interrelationship of the three criminal justice system components in the United States. Crime reporting methodology, theories of crime causation, and current challenges to the system will be explored. <b>C-ID:</b> AJ 110.</p>

**CJ G141 3 Units (54 lecture hours)****Concepts of Criminal Law****Advisory:** ENGL C1000 or ENGL C1000E.**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter**Transfer Credit:** CSU; UC: Credit Limitation: CJ G123 and CJ G141 combined: maximum credit, 1 course.

This course offers an analysis of the doctrines of criminal liability in the United States and the classification of crimes against persons, property, morals, and public welfare. Special emphasis is placed on the classification of crime, the general elements of crime, the definitions of common and statutory law, and the nature of acceptable evidence. This course utilizes case law and case studies to introduce students to criminal law. The course will also include some limited discussion of prosecution and defense decision making, criminal culpability, and defenses to crimes. **C-ID:** AJ 120.

**CJ G150 3 Units (54 lecture hours)****Introduction To Corrections****Grading Mode:** Standard Letter**Transfer Credit:** CSU; UC.

This course will examine the history, theories, and practices concerning the institutionalization of criminal offenders in America. Students will study probation and parole systems, as well as jail and prison programs currently in use in the United States. Incarceration trends will be analyzed along with the political environment's effect on the prosecution and sentencing process. Students will explore different crime causation theories and how they relate to historical and modern effectiveness in community-based corrections programs. Students will gain a historical and theoretical understanding of the issues related to managing inmates in institutions, and the constitutional issues that surround the corrections system. **C-ID:** AJ 200.

**CJ G172 2 Units (32 lecture hours; 12 lab hours)****P.C. 832 - Laws of Arrest****Grading Mode:** Pass/No Pass**Transfer Credit:** CSU.

This course is designed to satisfy the curriculum standards of the California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) as required by California Penal Code section 832 for Laws of Arrest. Course topics include professional orientation, criminal justice system, community relations, introduction to criminal law, laws of arrest, search and seizure, presentation of evidence, investigative report writing, use of force/baton, preliminary criminal investigation, arrest and control procedures (which will require a physical skills demonstration), crimes against the justice system, and cultural diversity.

**CJ G220 3 Units (54 lecture hours)****Forensic Accounting, Introduction****Grading Mode:** Standard Letter, Pass/No Pass**Transfer Credit:** CSU.

This course is identical to ACCT G220. This course provides an introduction to forensic accounting. The course examines the application of investigative accounting skills to collect, analyze, and evaluate evidential matter, as well as the interpretation and communication of such evidentiary findings in a court of law or other business or administrative venue. Topics include fraud detection, fraud investigation techniques, the legal environment surrounding forensic accounting, business valuation, and professional ethics and responsibilities. Enrollment Limitation: ACCT G220; students who complete CJ G220 may not enroll in or receive credit for ACCT G220.
