

# SOCIOLOGY (SOC)

## SOC G100 3 Units (54 lecture hours)

### Introduction To Sociology

**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter, Pass/No Pass

**Transfer Credit:** CSU; UC.

Recommended for every student interested in human behavior, social interrelationships and group organization, foundations of society, culture, social differentiation and social institutions. Graded or Pass/No Pass option. **C-ID:** SOCI 110.

## SOC G101 3 Units (54 lecture hours)

### Introduction to Ethnic Studies

**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter, Pass/No Pass

**Transfer Credit:** CSU.

This course is identical to ETHS G101. This course provides an intersectional overview to the examination of the social, historical, and political issues that impact ethnic and racial groups within the United States. Special emphasis is given to the lived experiences of Indigenous and Native American communities, Black, Latina/o, and Asian American and Pacific Islanders, their relationship with each other, and their relationship with American society. Enrollment Limitation: ETHS G101; students who complete SOC G101 may not enroll in or receive credit for ETHS G101. Graded or Pass/No Pass option.

## SOC G110 3 Units (54 lecture hours)

### Introduction To Marriage And The Family

**Advisory:** SOC G100.

**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter, Pass/No Pass

**Transfer Credit:** CSU; UC.

An introduction to the dynamics of marriage patterns, divorce and family life, including an analysis of interpersonal attraction, mate selection, marriage, parenthood, changing male and female roles and patterns of interaction within the family. Graded or Pass/No Pass option. **C-ID:** SOCI 130.

## SOC G111 3 Units (54 lecture hours)

### Social Justice and U.S. Ethnic Communities

**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter, Pass/No Pass

**Transfer Credit:** CSU; UC.

This course is identical to ETHS G111. This course is an applied study to social justice with an emphasis on race and ethnicity in the United States. It examines the socio-economic, cultural, and political conditions that contribute to inequality among key social groups and the struggle for social justice and liberation. The class will focus on Native Americans, African Americans, Latinx Americans, Asian Americans and the intersection with gender, sexuality, and religion. The course requires engagement with anti-racist issues, practices, and movements. Enrollment Limitation: ETHS G111; students who complete SOC G111 may not enroll in or receive credit for ETHS G111. Graded or Pass/No Pass option. **C-ID:** SJS 110.

## SOC G115 3 Units (54 lecture hours)

### Introduction to LGBTQ Studies

**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter, Pass/No Pass

**Transfer Credit:** CSU; UC.

This course provides an introduction to gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ) studies. Examines a range of issues related to LGBTQ individuals and communities in the United States and globally. Includes a study of key figures and history of civil rights movement for LGBTQ and explores sexual orientation and gender identity across cultures. Graded or Pass/No Pass option. **C-ID:** SJS 130.

## SOC G125 3 Units (54 lecture hours)

### Introduction to Statistics in Sociology

**Prerequisite(s):** Course taught at the level of intermediate algebra or appropriate math placement.

**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter, Pass/No Pass

**Transfer Credit:** CSU; UC.

This course introduces probability techniques, hypothesis testing and predictive techniques used in sociological research. Topics include descriptive statistics, probability and sampling distributions, statistical inference, correlation and linear regression, chi-square and t-test, and application of technology for statistical analysis and interpretation of statistical findings. It provides an introductory statistics course for sociology majors and other social science or health majors and provides applications using data from social science, business, sciences, and education. Enrollment Limitation: ECON G160/MATH G160/MATH G160S/PSYC G140; students who complete SOC G125 may not enroll in or receive credit for ECON G160, MATH G160, MATH G160S, or PSYC G140. Graded or Pass/No Pass option. **C-ID:** MATH 110.

## SOC G133 3 Units (54 lecture hours)

### Introduction to Race and Ethnicity

**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter, Pass/No Pass

**Transfer Credit:** CSU; UC.

This course is identical to ETHS G133. Formerly: Racial and Ethnic Relations in America. This course provides an overview of sociological theories and issues concerning the historical and contemporary patterns of interactions of major American racial and ethnic groups with an emphasis on Native Americans, African Americans, Latinx Americans, and Asian Americans through analysis of race, ethnicity, and racism. It examines how culture and social institutions contribute to or counteract racial and ethnic inequalities. The course discusses minority immigration and assimilation as it relates to society and culture in the United States. Enrollment Limitation:ETHS G133; students who completeSOC G133 may not enroll in or receive credit for ETHS G133. Graded or Pass/No Pass option. **C-ID:** SOCI 110; SOCI 150.

## SOC G134 3 Units (54 lecture hours)

### Introduction to Chicana/o Studies

**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter, Pass/No Pass

**Transfer Credit:** CSU; UC.

This course is identical to ETHS G134. Formerly: Introduction to Chicano Studies. This course provides an overview of the Chicana/o historical experience and of social development in the U.S. The course will survey the Chicana/o culture, customs, politics, labor conflict, immigration patterns, achievements and contributions to society in the United States. Enrollment Limitation: ETHS G134; students who complete SOC G134 may not enroll in or receive credit for ETHS G134. Graded or Pass/No Pass option.

- SOC G135** **3 Units (54 lecture hours)**  
**Introduction to Native American Studies**  
**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter, Pass/No Pass  
**Transfer Credit:** CSU; UC.  
 This course is identical to ETHS G135. This course provides an introduction to indigenous and native societies in North America. Students will examine the historical and contemporary Native American struggles against racism, land dispossession, forced acculturation, and poverty within the United States highlighting the Native people's ongoing struggle for social justice and the efforts to rebuild, revitalize, and reclaim their identity. Enrollment Limitation: ETHS G135; students who complete SOC G135 may not enroll in or receive credit for ETHS G135. Graded or Pass/No Pass option.
- SOC G136** **3 Units (54 lecture hours)**  
**Introduction to Black and African American Studies**  
**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter, Pass/No Pass  
**Transfer Credit:** CSU.  
 This course is identical to ETHS G136. This course is an introduction to Black and African American Studies that centers on history, culture, and politics of the Black community in the United States. Special attention is given to exploring theoretical concepts and social processes such as the social construction of Blackness, white supremacy, racialization, social inequality, Black civil rights, racial justice, and liberation. Enrollment Limitation: ETHS G136; students who complete SOC G136 may not enroll in or receive credit for ETHS G136. Graded or Pass/No Pass option.
- SOC G137** **3 Units (54 lecture hours)**  
**Introduction to Asian American and Pacific Islander**  
**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter, Pass/No Pass  
**Transfer Credit:** CSU.  
 This course is identical to ETHS G137. This course explores the diverse histories and contemporary social, cultural, and political experiences of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders in the United States with an emphasis on prejudice, racism, and resistance in structural forces and institutions of media, education, employment, and politics. The course will address the intersecting categories of race, ethnicity, gender, sexuality, and class, as well as major themes including U.S. imperialism and colonialism, migration, labor, citizenship, and identity. Enrollment Limitation: ETHS G137; students who complete SOC G137 may not enroll in or receive credit for ETHS G137. Graded or Pass/No Pass option.
- SOC G140** **3 Units (54 lecture hours)**  
**Introduction to Gender**  
**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter, Pass/No Pass  
**Transfer Credit:** CSU; UC.  
 This course provides an introduction to the social construction of gender, masculinity, and femininity historically and across culture. It examines debates on sex and gender, and analyzes how institutions shape gender and the impact of political change on gender expectations in society. Graded or Pass/No Pass option. **C-ID:** SOCI 140.
- SOC G160** **3 Units (54 lecture hours)**  
**Sociology of Criminology**  
**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter, Pass/No Pass  
**Transfer Credit:** CSU; UC.  
 Sociological analysis of crime, criminal behavior, and the criminal justice system. Explores the history and social construction of crime and criminality and examines the definition of crime and its violations as well as the laws and methods used to control criminal behavior. Discuss measurement of crime and basic theoretical explanations of criminal behavior. Graded or Pass/No Pass option. **C-ID:** SOCI 160.
- SOC G185** **3 Units (54 lecture hours)**  
**Analysis of Social Problems**  
**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter  
**Transfer Credit:** CSU; UC.  
 Formerly: SOC G150 – Social Trend and Problems. American social problems, value systems within which problems develop industrialization, population, crime and delinquency, family, race relations, education, health care, drugs and alcohol and violence. Graded. **C-ID:** SOCI 115.
- SOC G200** **3 Units (54 lecture hours)**  
**Introduction to Research Methods**  
**Prerequisite(s):** SOC G100.  
**Advisory:** MATH G160 or ECON G160 or PSYC G140 or completion of, or concurrent enrollment in, any introductory level social or behavioral science course.  
**Grading Mode:** Standard Letter, Pass/No Pass  
**Transfer Credit:** CSU; UC.  
 This course introduces students to research methods used in the social and behavioral sciences. Students analyze the ways in which empirical research is used to gather, evaluate and critique data. Students apply scientific investigation to social and/or behavioral subject matter. Graded or Pass/No Pass option. **C-ID:** SOCI 120; POLS 160.
